January 2020 You Found Me: New Research on How Unchurched Nones,
Millennials, and Irreligious Are Surprisingly Open to Christian Faith by Rick Richardson

It seems there has been an over emphasis on the decline of the American church rather than examining the many churches that are bucking the trend. The combination of a defensive posture towards culture and an assumption that people are generally resistant to the gospel can discourage a congregation from engaging in evangelism. This book challenges the popular notion that unchurched people are closed to personal invitations; that they are closed to checking out Jesus and His claims. This resource balances optimism with a realistic examination of the challenges posed by the current cultural mood. This is an important read offering practical advice that will help Christ-followers grow as effective ambassadors of the Gospel.

The author of this resource is Dr. Rick Richardson. He is an outstanding teacher and researcher. He directs the Billy Graham Center Institute and its Church Evangelism Initiative. He is also the professor of evangelism and leadership at Wheaton College Graduate School.

Amazon Description: We hear a steady stream of reports about how droves of people, especially younger generations, are abandoning Christianity. But new research shows that unchurched Americans are surprisingly more receptive and open to the Christian faith than is commonly assumed.

Researcher and practitioner Rick Richardson unveils the findings of the Billy Graham Center Institute's groundbreaking studies on the unchurched. A study of 2000 unchurched people across the country reveals that the unchurched are still remarkably open to faith conversations and the church. Even unchurched "nones" and millennials are quite receptive if they are approached in particular ways.

In this book you will also find best practices from further research into the top ten percent of churches that most effectively reach the unchurched. People who were previously unchurched share what actually moved them to faith and Christian commitment. And the research shows that churches and organizations can be transformed to become places where conversion growth becomes the new normal.

Through the development of multiple Fresh Expressions gatherings his congregation has experienced both revitalization and effective evangelism. This book is not solely about Fresh Expressions, however, it's a great example of how FX and other creative efforts can be explored as a path towards effective evangelism regardless of a church's size.

At the end of each chapter are discussion questions. It is recommended that each LLC use these as a study guide in wrestling with the content of each chapter.

September 2020 Pastor Paul (Theological Explorations for the Church Catholic): Nurturing a Culture of Christoformity in the Church by Scot McKnight Part One – Pages 1-102

Scot McKnight is a leading New Testament scholar who has examined the themes that Paul emphasized through his teaching and lifestyle that established a well-balanced, Christformed, approach to shepherding the church. An essential, often missing theme, in the pursuit of growing healthy churches is the need for God's people to yield to Christ as the head of His church. McKnight has identified seven practices, that if put into action, will

shape the pastor and the church into a Christ-formed body. Pastors would be wise to pursue these pastoral practices as foundational to developing healthy church cultures.

From Amazon: According to popular New Testament scholar Scot McKnight, pastoring must begin first and foremost with spiritual formation, which plays a vital role in the life and ministry of the pastor. As leaders, pastors both create and nurture culture in a church. The biblical vision for that culture is Christoformity, or Christlikeness.
